

# 5 easy steps to use WordFlyers for punctuation homework

Use WordFlyers to quickly set your students a series of lessons that will teach them punctuation skills and provide plenty of practice to consolidate those skills.

Follow these 5 simple steps and the lesson options to create apostrophe homework for your whole class or individual students today.

1. Select **Study Plans** from the left navigation on your teacher dashboard.

2. Click **Add** to create a new study plan. Type in a name for your study plan. Then click **Create**.

3. Add students to your study plan by clicking **Add class** or **Add students individually**.

4. Select **Add tasks** and use the Punctuation lessons list below to find the content. Then click on the unit name and select the Punctuation lesson. Select **Activate** to save the Study Plan.

5. Your students will receive a message that you have set them homework.



